Eric OLANDER is the Managing Editor of The China Africa Project (CAP), an independent, non-partisan multimedia news initiative dedicated to exploring every facet of Chinese engagement in Africa. Eric has more than 25 years of journalism experience as a chief editor, producer, and correspondent at many of the world's leading international news organizations including CNN, the BBC World Service, the Associated Press, and FRANCE 24 among others. He's worked all over the world producing radio, TV, and digital journalism, but his primary area of expertise is China where's spent more than a decade in both academic and professional capacities. Eric is a fluent Mandarin speaker with an undergraduate degree in East African history from the University of California at Berkeley and a Master's of Public Affairs from the University of Hong Kong.



Cobus VAN STADEN is a senior researcher focusing on Africa-China relations at the South African Institute of International Affairs (SAIIA), and a visiting lecturer at the University of the Witwatersrand's Department of Media Studies. He holds a PhD in Media Studies from the University of Nagoya, Japan. He is the co-founder of the China-Africa Project and co-host of its regular China in Africa Podcast. His work focuses on Chinese public diplomacy and media messaging in Africa. He has been a visiting lecturer at Central European University in Hungary (now Austria), at Communications University of China, and Rhodes University in South Africa. His book *Anxious Joburg: The Inner Lives of a Global South City* was published in 2020.



Deborah BRAUTIGAM is the Director of the China Africa Research Initiative (SAIS-CARI) and the Bernard L. Schwartz Professor of International Political Economy at the Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) at Johns Hopkins University. A leading expert on China in Africa, Professor Brautigam is the author of *Will Africa Feed China?* (Oxford University Press, 2015), *The Dragon's Gift: The Real Story of China in Africa* (Oxford University Press, 2010; Chinese version published by Chinese Academy of Social Sciences Press) and *Chinese Aid and African Development: Exporting Green Revolution* (St. Martin's Press, 1998). She is also co-editor of *Taxation and State-Building: Capacity and Consent* (Cambridge University Press, 2008) as well as numerous articles published in academic journals and public affairs media. Professor Brautigam regularly advises international agencies and governments on China-Africa economic engagement.



Kevin P. GALLAGHER is a Professor of Global Development Policy at Boston University's Frederick S. Pardee School of Global Studies, where he directs the Global Development Policy Center. He is the author or co-author of six books, including *The China Triangle: Latin America's China Boom* (2016). Gallagher serves on the United Nations' Committee for Development Policy and co-chairs the T20 Task Force on An International Financial Architecture for Stability and Development at the G20. He previously served on the investment sub-committee of the Advisory Committee on International Economic Policy at the US Department of State and on the National Advisory Committee at the Environmental Protection Agency. Gallagher has been a visiting or adjunct professor at the Paul Nitze School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University; El Colegio de México in Mexico; Tsinghua University in China, and the Center for State and Society in Argentina.



Matthew MINGEY is a senior analyst at Rhodium Group, an economic research firm, where he focuses on emerging market finance and China's economic diplomacy. He oversees the Group's database of debt renegotiations involving China, and tracks the impact of China's global aid, loan, and investment flows. Matthew is also an Associate at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA), as part of the Capstone program.



Evis RUCAJ is Senior Economist/Statistician at the World Bank. She has over 20 years of experience on policy-relevant external sector statistics. She leads the Debt Data team of the Development Data Group. Evis oversees the publication of International Debt Statistics publication and the compilation and dissemination of the World Bank Debtor Reporting System (DRS) database, quarterly external debt statistics (QEDS) as well as quarterly public sector debt statistics (QPSD) in a collaborative effort with the IMF and the OECD. Prior to the World Bank, she was Deputy Director of the Statistics Department at the Bank of Albania.



Anna GELPERN is an Anne Fleming Research Professor at Georgetown Law and a nonresident senior fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics. She has published research on government debt, contracts, and regulation of financial institutions and markets. She has co-authored a law textbook on International Finance, and has contributed to international initiatives on financial reform and government debt. She co-directs the Sovereign Debt Forum, a collaboration among Georgetown Law's Institute of International Economic Law and academic institutions in the United States and Europe, dedicated to cutting edge research and capacity building in sovereign debt management.
